To continue to expand Registered Apprenticeships, prepare young workers for good quality jobs and strengthen the nation's workforce to meet industry demands, the <u>U.S. Department of Labor announced</u> <u>the award</u> of \$90 million in grants to 68 organizations in 32 states to provide training and employment services on April 28, 2023.

Ranging from \$700,000 to \$1.5 million each, the awards' announcement follows the department <u>announcement of the availability of YouthBuild grants</u> in November 2022. The grants will support pre-apprenticeships that will educate and train young people, from ages 16 to 24, who are neither enrolled in school nor in the labor market for jobs in high-demand industries. These industries include the construction industry, for which YouthBuild grants will help deliver education and training to enable students to use their abilities to build or rehabilitate affordable housing in their communities for low-income or unhoused families.

Administered by the department's <u>Employment and Training Administration</u>, and supported by the <u>Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act</u>, YouthBuild grants support a pre-apprenticeship model that provides disadvantaged young people with occupational skills training, employment services and educational guidance.

YouthBuild participants will divide their time between classroom instruction – where they earn their high school diploma or equivalency degree – and workplace training to prepare for postsecondary opportunities. The grants will also enable young people to train for careers in healthcare, information technology, manufacturing and logistics, culinary arts and hospitality.

Youth in Advanced Manufacturing will receive 65 hours of training and apprenticeship opportunities OR they will complete CHW I certification through AHEC which offers pre-apprenticeship, service-learning, and apprenticeship as well as support for entryway into careers or higher education.
